In the last issue it was mentioned that a Hereford-influenced calf sale for Missouri was in the planning stages. A date has now been set for November 29, 2017 and the sale will be held at the South Central Regionals Stockyards, Inc., Vienna, Mo. More comprehensive information on this sale is outlined on page 36.

I want to personally thank David, Bill and Ross Patton for meeting with Joe Kaczmareck, Steve Greene, Trey Befort and myself recently to discuss and start planning for this sale. The Patton crew were gracious hosts for the noon meeting and served us Certified Hereford Beef (CHB) strips. The restaurant at the barn prides itself for serving CHB and receives many compliments.

During the meeting several points were discussed, and we appreciated the straightforward comments from the sale barn owners. The barn itself promotes a Star "Vac Plus" red tag program and Star "Green" tag program. The barn provides the tags which identify if the home-raised calves have been properly weaned and have received two round of shots (red tag) or one round of shots (green tag). They will provide these tags for this Hereford-influenced sale free of charge to the consignors. The specifics for the red tag and green tag program are also outlined in this issue.

It was a unanimous feeling around the table that for this sale to be a success, consignors need to follow the requirements for the red tag or green tag program. Putting our best foot forward for the buyers of the calves will guarantee this outcome.

I want to personally encourage the Missouri Hereford breeders to strongly consider either consigning calves to this sale, call your bull buyers and encourage them to consign to this sale, or both. We have all heard about and some have taken the "red hide/white face" sale barn discount. This sale is a strong attempt to correct this.

Also, in the last issue I related a success story of Larry Day sending six calves to Net Worth Feeds and Feeding owned by Frank Barnitz, Lake Spring, Mo. The calves realized a strong profit of \$238.53 per calf after backgrounding the calves for a period of 100+ days and co-mingling them into pot load lots with other calves.

The opportunity to visit Net Worth Feeds and Feeding came about recently and it was a learning experience. The business plan is really pretty basic and yet is very effective in getting more profit out of a calf crop. Combining a superior feeding program, a comprehensive health program, solid contacts with feedyards and co-mingling groups of calves to give them the best market opportunity plays well for producers who have small groups of calves. This lot, located near Rolla, Mo., is yet another opportunity for Hereford breeders.

Jumping across the northern state line presents another opportunity to Hereford breeders on October 11, 2017. Bill Goehring, owner of the Keosauqua Sale barn, Keosaugua, Iowa, will have a Hereford and Hereford-influenced female sale. Consignments can be groups of Hereford or Hereford-influenced breeding females as open heifer calves, open heifers ready to breed, bred heifers, bred cows or pairs. This sale will be held in conjunction with the regular Saturday sale. Bill hopes there is enough interest from this sale that in the future it will warrant its own sale day. Along with being the sale barn owner, Bill is a Hereford breeder seeing both sides of the fence. He believes in Herefords and says there is always a need for good groups of Hereford and Hereford-influenced breeding


The Annual Meeting and Conference will conclude Saturday morning after the Annual Membership Meeting where three new board members will be elected.

The Ranch Ritchen's Puffy French Toast Ingredients 2 eggs, whole

- · 3 Tbsp sugar, white granulated, Stevia or Splenda
- · 1 tsp Vanila, I used Mexican Vanilla that has a better flavor
- · 2 cup(s) evaporated milk (1 12 ounce can with 1/2 cup water)
- · 1 cup(s) flour, white All Purpose

- 2 1/2 tsp baking powder
- · 12 slice(s) white sandwich bread or Texas, left whole or cut in 1 inch slices
- · Blackburn's Butter Pecan Pancake & Waffle Syrup or any syrup (but I love my Blackburn's)
- · Cinnamon sugar for topping
- · 2 cup(s) powdered sugar (white)

Instructions

- 1. In a medium sized bowl, mix the eggs well and add sugar, vanilla and milk (I used evaporated milk as I felt it gives the toast a richer flavor...and I am always out of milk)!
- 2. Add the flour and baking powder slowly and not all at once, mixing until smooth with a whisk.
- 3. Dip bread in batter on both sides.
- 4. Remove carefully from the batter (do not allow your bread to sit too long in the batter or it will begin to fall apart) and place in hot oil. I used Canola Oil, but vegetable oil is fine also.
- s. Fry in two inches of oil until golden brown on a medium/high heat, but not too high to burn or begin to smoke the oil.
- 6 Drain on paper towels and immediately coat these with powdered sugar and cinnamon sugar.
- 7. Serve these immediately and enjoy! We especially enjoyed this with a few drizzles of chocolate syrup (the ice cream variety chocolate

Cook's Note: We only coated my Puffy French Toast with powdered sugar that we were going to eat that day. I placed the rest after they cooled in a Ziploc bag in the fridge and we took out what we wanted each morning there after. These would also freeze easily. Microwave for about a minute or two checking constantly to warm these up as with any bread if you 'nuke' them too long, they become like cardboard!

Great Enting Experience

For beef producers, having a perfect eating experience every time beef is served is a must. As with a producer of any food substance, anything less than perfect isn't acceptable when you've put your heart and soul into raising animal protein or crops.

As producers, importance of the fundamentals to production are key, however, being able to both prepare and then communicate cooking methods with consumers is just as important in the success of the industry. If we all continue to educate ourselves on the end product we are producing and then spread this message even with our neighbors and friends, we are doing our part.

To take it a step further, getting involved in programs such as the National Beef Ambassador program or American National CattleWomen to further promote beef to consumers is vital to our industry's success. Any cattle group you are involved in can take a part in beef promotion. We are the voice of our industry.

The main 6 ways to cook beef include grilling, roasting, braising, sautéing, baking and broiling. Lets look at each of these cooking methods and what cuts of beef best work with these cooking types.

Grilling is the most famous way to prepare beef. When people talk about a backyard barbecue, most would think of beef on the grill. Most cuts from the Loin or Rib are suitable for the grill. Also, cuts such as the skirt steak and Flank steak, are great, but placing them in a marinade high in acidity for at least a few hours before will greatly improve the eating experience.

Roasting is perfect for your roast cuts of beef. This is a dry heat method of cooking, roasting in an uncovered pan. Roasting helps to retain the juices and provide the crisp exterior that the family fights over (because everyone really wants the end piece). Loin and Round roasts are best for this type of cooking method.

The braising cooking method seems like a perfect choice for the upcoming cooler temperatures. This low and slow process uses moist heat where beef cooks in a covered pot with liquid. Most chefs recommend a heavy, cast iron or enamel-coated Dutch oven for best results. Those less tender, more economical cuts of beef such as Round roasts, Brisket and ribs are great for this longer timed cooking method.

When you get home at dinner time and don't have anything planned, turned to sautéing as your cooking method choice. Any Rib or Loin cut, ground beef or tri-tip steak can be sautéed in a fast, high heat using just a bit of oil. Stir-fries are a great meal option for this type of cooking.

Casseroles are the most famous use of ground beef prepared by Americans at least once a week, according to the Beef Check-Off. This dry heat cooking method warms dishes in the oven, baking until the dish bubbles.

If you are looking for an extra special treat for your family or guests, use the broiling cooking method for your high-end steaks. Using direct, high heat, cook steaks one inch thick such as sirloin, rib or strip quickly.

Just think, most consumers who go to the grocery store and stand at the meat counter, have little to no education on the above terminology. If we do our part in spreading the message, it will certainly help consumers make more educated decisions to guarantee they have a good eating experience every time they choose to serve beef to their families.


Whay does it matter what cooking method we choose for the cuts we are going to use?

Dr. Carol L. Lorenzen, Professor of Meat Science at the University of Missouri explains it for us.

"Choosing the correct cooking method to ensure a desirable eating experience has to do with the level of inherent tenderness in the beef cut, specifically the level of connective tissue which is associated with muscle use.

A rule of thumb to follow is that muscles used in supporting the body such as those found in the loin and rib are tender and can withstand harsher cooking methods such as those that use dry heat and cook meat quickly. Muscles that are used in locomotion such as those found in the chuck and round need a little help to achieve a tender outcome; for those muscles you want to use moist heat cooking methods that cook meat low and slow allowing the connective tissue to break down and melt out of the cut.

There are some exceptions such as the Flat Iron that comes out of the chuck and the skirt and flank steaks."

U.S. Cattle Outlook: More Beef

(and Financial Challenges) Ahead

Higher cattle numbers and beef production along with lower prices has been the theme of markets in the last two years, and this situation is expected to continue for at least the next couple of years. The recently released USDA July Cattle Report showed most inventory categories had grown significantly relative to July 2015, including beef cows (up 6.6 percent) and total cattle and calves (up 4.5 percent).


It is difficult to stop the momentum of a multi-year beef cow expansion. While producers may be tapping the brakes on expansion, it will take larger measures to halt rising inventories anytime soon. The drought in the Northern Plains is an event that could lead to a speedier reduction in the national herd if it were to continue and intensify. But while conditions are extremely challenging for cow-calf producers near the heart of the worst conditions, only 13 percent of U.S. beef cow inventory resides in Montana, North Dakota and South Dakota, and most of the rest of the nation is experiencing average to above average pasture and range conditions.

With more cows and beef expected to be a reality for quite some time, producers

need to consider the best production and marketing strategies to maximize the value of their operation. The following trends regarding wholesale beef movement make a strong case that consumers have a growing appetite for higher-quality beef grades, but that the market for lower grades of beef is shrinking. Figure 1 displays USDA-AMS data for the number of loads from fed steer/heifer sales in each of three quality categories: prime and branded; choice; select and ungraded. The YTD 2017 figure uses data through the second week of August and assumes that the year to date changes relative to last year will continue through the end of December. One load of beef contains 40 thousand pounds.

This graphic highlights the fact that one must be careful in describing overall beef demand, as the components of total beef demand

and choice-select have not deviated significantly from historical ranges in recent quarters, suggesting that the quantity being supplied for each quality grade is not far removed from the quantity demanded by the marketplace. If anything, rather wide prime-choice and choice-select spreads in recent weeks would suggest that the graphic is underestimating the trend

toward higher quality beef for 2017.

There are many good reasons to expect these trends to continue. Economic growth and unemployment projections for the next few quarters imply that consumer spending on restaurant

dining and premium eating experiences should remain strong through 2018. Expectations for another sharp jump in pork production and continued high chicken production levels for the next few quarters will continue to pressure select and ungraded beef, and to a lesser extent choice beef, as it is believed that these meats are better able to substitute for lower beef quality grades due to more similar pricing points. Also, with retail meat prices likely to be under pressure for the next few quarters due to strong total meat production growth, the fear of higher-quality beef reaching prices that result in consumer stickershock and a pullback in purchases is not anticipated.

One wildcard on the demand side deals with U.S. beef export expectations. Exports will be

near the record level of 2011 this year, with further growth expected in 2018. Strong shipments to Japan and South Korea have provided much of the growth in recent quarters, though NAFTA partners Mexico and Canada remain important destinations for U.S. beef and successful renegotiation of

the price spreads between prime-choice NAFTA critical to U.S. cattle markets. The resumption of beef shipments to China has justifiably provided much optimism for additional beef exports in the longrun, though it is unclear how quickly U.S. producers will be able to satisfy in large quantities the requirements placed on beef products entering China.

Though export levels are important to future price and profitability projections, it is necessary to realize that U.S. residents account for more than 90 percent of U.S. beef consumption, and this portion is



unlikely to decrease substantially anytime soon. Figure 2 shows recent annual changes in the supply and demand balance for beef. All data including projections are provided by USDA's mid-August WASDE release.


Things have changed dramatically in the last two or three years. From a beef cow herd which had shrunk 16 times in 18 years and record high cattle prices and profitability in 2014-2015 to three straight years of herd growth and sharply lower prices which place many cow-calf operators struggling to breakeven financially. The price pressure is expected to remain as supplies continue to rise in the next two or three years. Though there are bright spots in future demand, they tend to line up with higher-quality domestic beef products and to a lesser extent new beef export opportunities, some which include markets that restrict products to be from cattle achieving particular specifications.

Exports will be near the record level of 2011 this year, with further growth expected in 2018.

How do these changes affect your operation? Are you producing calves

that qualify for developing export markets? Does a change in your herd make sense for your operation given the trends occurring in beef demand? The next few years have the potential to be very difficult for meat and cattle industry participants who are unable to capitalize on growth opportunities that exist, as the amount of meat available in the U.S. marketplace continues to increase. A successful producer must understand their cost structure and how it compares to other producers, as well as the viability of new opportunities. These opportunities certainly will present themselves and nimble producers may find them a chance to increase their bottom lines.

Growing up on the farm, I would encounter dozens of baling wire repairs every day. Broken door hinges would become workable, once again, after Dad's application of the rusty, old, fixit material. and my first car ran the last 50,000 miles of its life with a front stabilizer bar fastened securely with baling wire.

The mystery was solved one day when I accompanied my father to a farm sale and the auctioneer failed to get a one-dollar bid on a pile of used baling wire big enough to fill the bed of a pickup truck. "I'll give you fifty cents," Dad yelled out.


"Sold," announced the good colonel. That pile lasted him the rest of his life.

I did not inherit my dad's genius at fixing things with what's lying around, but...I try. A few weeks ago, before the floods began, a strong windstorm blew down one of the downspouts from the corner of our home. The 25-foot piece was bent and twisted beyond eye-pleasing repair, so I had to special order two pieces to replace it. While we were waiting (it's been five weeks and we're still waiting) the flooding rains began and, without a downspout, the runoff from the eave- trough poured in behind our siding and began to flood the lower floor of our house. Temporary and emergency action had to be taken.

In the pouring rain, I straightened out the two long sections that were bent, enough so that I deduced they would carry water. I then melded the two together into one long piece with enough duct tape to repair a NASCAR racer. With that accomplished, I then jammed it up into the eave- trough opening and secured the bottom section to the corner of our wooden deck with baler twine and two more rolls of duct tape. It held... for that rainstorm.

In a couple of days, all my handiwork came apart, so I repaired it the same way again to weather even more rain and flooding. When my masterpiece came apart the third time, leading to more wet carpets and a questionable attitude from my wife, she asked, "Why can't you fix that thing so it will stay put?"






